

# **Our Big Story**

The U.S. government, through the Agency for International Development (USAID), announced its continuing support to the education sector in Sokoto state with the signing of a memorandum of understanding (MoU) by the USAID Mission Director Michael T. Harvey and the Governor of Sokoto Aminu Waziri Tambuwal. This fiveyear MoU sets out the shared and individual commitments for collaboration in the education sector made by both USAID and the Government of Sokoto and provides a framework for mutual accountability for education activities in Sokoto State. Governor Tambuwal is committed to the sustainability of USAID's initiatives in Sokoto state. Under the Northern Education Initiative Plus, the Sokoto state government has included the teacher professional development for Early Grade Reading in its state action plan which allows it access funds from the Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC) to train teachers. Sokoto state government also proposed replicating and scaling-up the Early Grade Reading program implemented in schools to 13 other local government areas (LGAs) not covered by the Initiative.

## Highlights of the Week

- Commenced data collection for Early Grade Reading Assessment in sample Non-Formal Learning Centers (NFLCs) in Bauchi and Sokoto states. The assessment provides baseline information for Early Grade Reading intervention in NFLCs.
- Conducted awareness training on anti-trafficking for all staff to help increase awareness and educate on the indicators of human trafficking.
- Conducted focus group discussions in three selected LGAs each in Bauchi and Sokoto states. The focus groups consist of women, men, children and religious/ community leaders and is meant to provide evidence to inform media campaigns motivating parents to support education.
- Planned to conduct rolling Community Education and Conflict Assessment/Gender Analysis (CECA/GA).
- Deployed the Institutional Capacity Assessment Tool in the State Ministry of Education, State Agency for Mass Education, State Universal Basic Education Board and Local Government Education Authorities in Bauchi and Sokoto states. This tool identifies areas for strengthening within these ministries and line agencies to improve quality education service delivery.
- Concluded internal compliance review of project operations, human resources, finance, procurement and technical activities.
- Developed and translated into Hausa four training manuals for School and Center Based Management Committees, Community Coalitions and Women Groups in Bauchi and Sokoto states to effectively monitor learning in centers and schools, promote safety and encourage parents to support their children to read early.

The communities have written a letter to the local government appreciating the efforts of the Initiative. People really appreciate the intervention of the project because they like how the learning facilitators teach the children. They say the children are learning faster and understanding better. They have wondered why such intervention delayed and wish it be sustained.

We pride ourselves in strengthening and supporting government systems so what plans do you have to continue educating out-of-school-children in your local government?

Some of these centers are under trees and we are working towards building structures so no matter the condition of the weather, children can learn. The local government is quite underfunded but we are working towards overcoming this challenge to implement these plans.

This room will also be the work site for the college-level technical working group as they partner with the National Commission for Colleges of Education and the Initiative to complete the NCE curriculum analysis and develop course materials not only to supplement existing courses, but for new courses specifically targeting early literacy skills.
